Word of the Week: Last Week: Commotion This week: Flock

Last week we extended the children's interest in colour mixing and provided lots of opportunities to investigate colour mixing with paint. The children showed brilliant curiosity as they selected which primary colours to mix together and used excellent language to describe what was happening. We developed this at the end of the week by using food colouring and pipettes to mix colours and make patterns on kitchen roll, it was a lot of fun!

We all thoroughly enjoyed reading 'Commotion in the Ocean' and learning about many different sea creatures. The children showed a particular interest in finding out more about clams! The children enjoyed water play and used their imagination as they played with different sea animals with their friends.

This week we have been making collage birds and painting pictures of birds to tie in with the Big School Birdwatch. We have been making bird feeders to hang up in the Nursery Garden to ensure the birds have plenty to eat during the winter and to allow us to do some bird spotting! The children have also shown excellent concentration whilst using their fine motor skills to investigate patterns with the peg boards.


Topaz


Word of the Week: Last week: retrieval This Week: biome
