We had a wonderful week last week getting to know our brood of chicks before they returned to live a free-range life at Row Farm. The children came up with some great names for our chicks and the results of the vote were Chicken Licken, Elsa, Daisy, Loveheart, Sonic and Tails! The farmer loved the names we chose! The children cared for them so well and although we are missing them we have been pleased to hear from the farmer that they are very happy. The children wrote some lovely cards for the chicks to take with them to their new home.

We weren't without feathery friends for long though as on Wednesday, Lizzie from the British Hen Welfare Trust came to run a special workshop to help the children learn even more about eggs and chickens. She brought two of her rescue hens, Tinsel and Pocket and Emerald Class loved being able to stroke them. They were fascinated to find out that chickens have 3 eyelids and to find out how a chick grows inside an egg. Lizzie also helped us understand the difference between caged and free range eggs and reminded us how important it is to buy free range eggs. The children enjoyed trying to break eggs by squeezing them- we discovered just how strong eggs really are!

This week our learning has focused around the Queen's platinum jubilee. We have learnt lots about our Queen and her family. We've been preparing for our street party on Friday by making Union Jack flags, bunting and even making cucumber sandwiches! We have also learnt the national anthem so we can sing it at our street party. The children have been absolutely flabbergasted that our Queen has reigned for 70 years- we all think it is an amazing achievement.

We also looked at the results of an 'egg-speriment' we have been doing in class to see how different drinks effect eggshells which is a bit like the enamel on our teeth. We discovered that Squash and orange juice did the most damage to the shells and that water was the best! Have a fabulous half term everyone, I can't quite believe next term is Emerald Class' last term of Reception but what incredible Year 1s they will be!
