

Notes from SLT: The Situation In Ukraine

During times of tragedy and difficulty in the news, we know that our young people will be aware of what is happening, but will not always be using reliable newsfeeds and sources to get this information. We want to ensure that we provide our young people with a balanced impartial and factual view of the situation. We will be discussing the humanitarian side and impact of this on all people affected by the conflict. The situation is obviously also all over the internet and on social media, on sites such as TikTok. What is on there can be extremely worrying and distressing for our young people, so we want them to know they can talk to us in school about it. In tutor time today we have discussed:

- The current situation as it stands
- The humanitarian impact of this on displaced families and individuals
- The need for compassion for people impacted

Advice about how to talk to your child about this situation:

- Be honest. In times of uncertainty, it's never more important for your child to have a strong, secure and trusting relationship with you. If you tell your child something that is not true, it may harm your relationship and their sense of stability.
- Acknowledge that this is a serious event but many countries are working together to figure out what to do. Point out that day to day life for your child will be the same. And of course, show empathy for the families that are currently vulnerable and under threat.
- If your child asks a question, you might be tempted to bat it away and say, 'Don't worry about that'. Be sure you answer it, otherwise, your child might fill the knowledge gap with worries (often inaccurate or extremely unlikely scenarios), information from another child or even social media. Their questions are your chance to help them understand the world's events in a safe, calm and measured environment.
- Particularly in the early stages of this situation, ask: 'What do you want to know?' rather than assume you know what is on their mind.
- Avoid stereotyping We will not lay the blame on any nation and will always challenge hateful talk. We have a legal duty to provide an impartial and balanced view of any political matter. We do occasionally use Newsround as an age appropriate, unbiased news programme and will continue to use this. We will however, continually monitor the frequency and the appropriateness of the programme for our students and young people.


Please do contact us if there are any personal circumstances which we would benefit from being aware of, so that we can work together for the best interest of your child.

WORLD BOOK DAY!



Friday 11th March 7 - 9:30 pm


